Writing Retreats

The UWC offers full-day retreats where graduate writers can focus on quiet, sustained writing together.

Retreats happen once a month and are free and open to all UT Austin graduate students. This semester, we will be alternating Saturday and Sunday retreats to accommodate student needs.

Attending a retreat is a great way to get some focused writing done in a community of fellow graduate students. Retreats include coffee, snacks, and the opportunity for mini-consultations with a writing consultant. **All weekend retreats are held from 10am-5pm**, but we invite you to come and go as you please!

Writing Groups

Offered in two sessions per semester, quiet writing groups meet once a week for 5-6 weeks. Led by graduate consultants, writing groups include accountability check-ins to set goals and reflect on personal writing habits and progress on a project, followed by a period of sustained quiet writing. This semester, writing groups will be offered both virtually and in-person!

The second fall session of writing groups will run for **five weeks**, from **Week 9 (October 20th)** through **Week 13 (November 17th)**. Our Fall 2025 Session 2 schedule is as follows:

- **Fridays 10:00am-12:00pm: Quiet Writing with Jake (virtual)**

Registration will close at noon on Thursday (10/16). *To give everyone the opportunity to participate, we ask that you limit your registration to two groups (including the semester-long groups) at this time.*



Standing Appointments

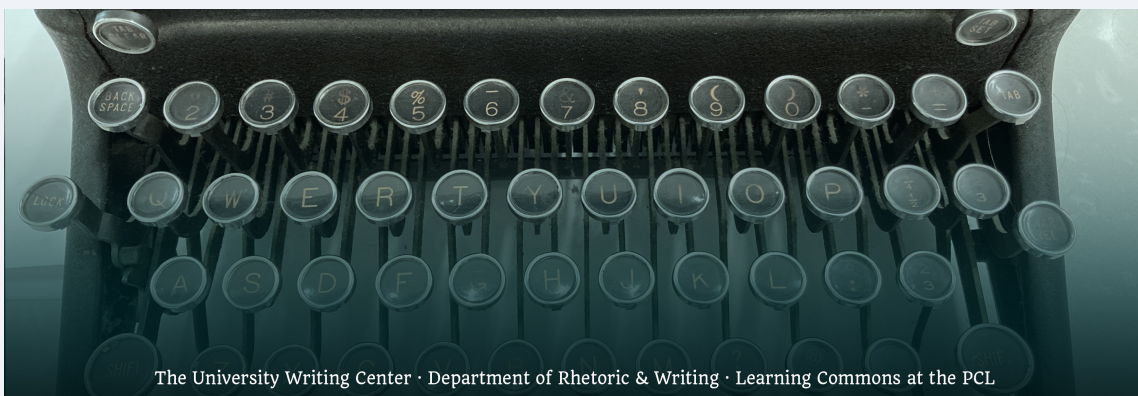
We offer a limited number of standing appointments each semester. Standing appointments are an opportunity for you to work with the same consultant over several weeks and are best suited for writers with a large, long-term project currently underway (like a thesis, article manuscript, or dissertation).

Our second fall session of standing appointments will run for **five weeks**, from the week of **October 20th** through the week of **November 17th**.

Michael Erard Book Talk

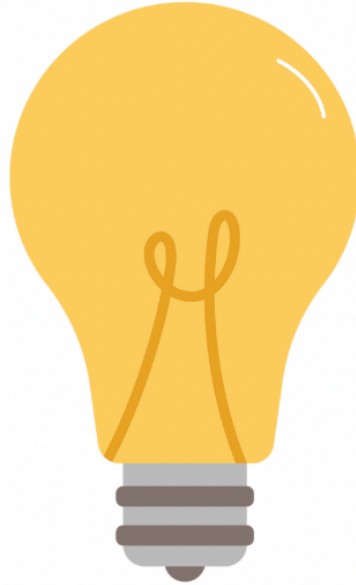
